<p>Key Achievements to date : During 2021-22 we:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ➤ Secured an additional swimming session for our Year 4 pupils so that Year 5 and Year 4 pupils will have weekly swimming lessons. ➤ Link established with King Edward's School resulted in our Year 4 pupils having a term of Cricket lessons. ➤ Our Year 3 and Year 5 pupils experienced a Bell boating session on the local canals led by a former British Olympic canoeist. ➤ Year 2 & Year 3 pupils each had a term of outdoor learning led by Roots to Fruits. ➤ We started to upskill lunchtime supervisors in the effective supervision/facilitation of games at lunchtimes. ➤ Launched a new House system alongside our Character Values so that in 2022-23 we can organise inter-house competitions. 	<p>Areas for further improvement and baseline evidence of need :</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ➤ Increase the percentage of year 6 children to swim 25m up to at least 75%. ➤ Develop a wider range of sporting opportunities for children in KS1 &2. ➤ Develop opportunities for participation in competitive sports across the school using the new Houses system as a vehicle for doing this. ➤ Link well-being with PE to support all children across the school ➤ Continue to develop confidence of lunchtime supervisors to facilitate/initiate lunchtime games supported by the introduction of pupil playground leaders. ➤ Promote active travel through use of walking and public transport for local trips/visits (swimming, walking into Birmingham for museum visits etc) ➤ Continue to develop opportunities for outdoor based learning where children are learning through physical activities.

The year 6's who had lessons throughout 21-22 will have a refresher block of lessons, post SATs.</p> <p>This approach means that year on year more of our children will receive swimming lessons in Year 4, 5 & 6 to support increasing the amount of children meeting the national curriculum requirements for swimming and water safety.</p>
